### **GRAND KNIGHT'S VIEWS**

We didn't exactly tip-toe into 2023.

In track they call it "running through the tape." For the St. Francis Knights of Columbus, it was that final sprint that took us through December in a mad dash to finish 2022 strong. Real Strong. There was no coasting into the new year for this group of Knights. It was a head down, dive in the dirt kind of finish for our council to end a very good year.

We started the final month with a Santa Breakfast, and the jolly, white-bearded Knight from the North Pole took orders from more than 100 kiddos. We threw a Christmas party for Knights and their families. We helped set up the Hall for that next morning's Eucharistic Miracles Display and helped staff the exhibit for the next week. We signed up to staff the Nocturnal Eucharistic Adoration. We put up Christmas trees, lights, and decorations, took down tables and set up 250 chairs in the Hall for Christmas Eve Mass. We guided cars into the parking lot for the Christmas Eve Masses and watched in



amazement as eight large fire trucks arrived just as the overflow Mass attendees were trying to get home and open some presents and break out the eggnog.

We started a new program called Outreach that's intended to help folks who need help. Just a moment to talk, or a shoulder to cry on. Or maybe just a ride...to church, to the store, to the dentist. We started with fixing a garbage disposal and it grew from there to something special.

We ended the year strongly on the first day of 2023 with the Knights sponsoring a Consecration to the Holy Family, a "Faith in Action for Families". It's a program that began on December 11 and coincides

with the Feast of the Holy Family. Knight Ben Davis worked with Father Erin to make this three-week program a fitting finish to the year.

We did all of this in the last month of 2022. And you should have seen the first 11 months where we ushered, sang in the choir, served as deacons, filled trucks with food and presents, donated to a large number of organizations that help people, cooked food for more than a thousand at the Marian House, served donuts and coffee to the parish on Sundays, cooked breakfasts and Lenten Dinners, helped our new pastor and council chaplain, used our backs and minds to do many more daily tasks that has established our council as one of the best in the world.

And this effort will set the stage for an amazing 2023 as we'll celebrate our 25<sup>th</sup> year as a council at Mount St. Francis. We will continue to grow in a special brotherhood that shines like the star that guided us to Christmas and our Savior.

## **Keep CHRIST in Christmas**

So bright is the radiance of the Light which has come at Christmas, so awesome is the mystery we celebrate, that a single day's observance barely initiates us into the meaning of the feast. Nor does the Church consider stopping with one day's rejoicing as she celebrates the birth of the Savior. Although the commercial world is taking down its trees and tinsel on December 26 to make way for the January white sales, the Church is only beginning <u>a full twelve days of</u> "high feasting" which will reach their climax and zenith on January 6. Then, in the regal splendor of Epiphany, we see another facet of the Incarnation, a facet which completes the Christmas mystery: the tiny Baby born on Christmas night is in reality the King of the whole world. All the expressions of our Advent longing, our pleas for the King and Ruler, "God, the Mighty, Wonderful, the Prince of Peace," may seem extravagant if we keep only December 25 as a feast day and forget the Epiphany, the real fulfillment of Advent expectation for a royal and kingly Savior. – *Catholic.org* 



# FAMILY OF THE MONTH

The November 2022 Family of the Month for the Mount St. Francis Knights of Columbus Council 12228 are **Steve and Judy Schwenk**.

For the last three years the Schwenks have managed the Thanksgiving Brown Bag project that has given meals to more than a thousand families and made Thanksgiving something special for each of them.

This year Steve and Judy helped fill more than 300 bags for families in a diocese-wide effort and raised more than \$2,500 in cash that families can use for gift cards to purchase turkeys.

They setup a table in the Narthex for two weeks, got some help from the youth in the Parish to pass out the bags and staff the tables, promoted the effort to the parish and filled up Room A on the bottom floor twice with the results of their efforts. And then they packed 'em all up and delivered them to St. Patrick's for distribution to Catholic Charities and Care and Share Foodbank that made that magic gift of a Thanksgiving meal to a lot of moms and dads, kids and families.

Judy and Steve have been on the Giving and Receiving teams of Christ Renews His Parish. Both are Lectors and Eucharistic Ministers of Communion. Steve also assisted the Silver Rose Mass as a Lector when it came through Colorado Springs going from Canada to Mexico.

You can spot them both in the pews with grandkids, usually at the 10:30 morning Sunday Mass. They are a valuable pair for our parish.

For their passion in the Lord's work, we honor Steve and Judy Schwenk as the November Family of the Month for the Knights of Columbus Council 12228.

# **KNIGHT OF THE MONTH**

Dick Eckenrode has been a Knight for 17 years. He goes to a few meetings, makes the Valentine's party with his daughters and her family. Knows a few of the more mature men in this council. But this honor is not about what he's done for the council. It's more about what he's done for his country.

Dick is probably the only guy in the room to help send a guy to the moon.

He worked on the Mercury project, then Gemini, then the Appollos. He was co-designer of the Gemini's instrument panel. He worked with the original seven astronauts and interfaced with the next 10 astronauts, including Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon.

Dick was a young engineer, having completed his degree at St. Louis University, earning his aeronautical engineering degree. After four years in the Air Force he landed a job at McDonnell Douglas and was assigned to the system engineering group along psychologists, psychiatrists and medical doctors, all combining efforts to train the astronauts and design their space craft's cockpits and control panels.

It must have worked. We made it to the moon.

After the moon projects, Dick worked at Dunlap and Associates in Stamford, Conn, mainly on military projects: tanks, Navy submarines, anti-ship and anti-submarine weapon systems. He wrote a report on all the weapon systems used against submarines for the Navy.

He was eventually recruited by the government after the Three-Mile Island nuclear accident and worked for the Nuclear Regulatory Commission where his job was reviewing the design of 104 nuclear power plant control rooms throughout the U.S.

After that, he did the design review of the reactor control panel of the Virginia Class submarines. Each sub built today relies on the same design.

Ten years ago, he said he'd had enough. Dick moved to Colorado Springs with his late wife Kate after he retired from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and found his way to St. Francis. On Christmas Eve Dick will turn 90. With a whole lot of memories.

For his efforts and contributions to American History we salute Dick Eckenrode for more than Knight of the Month for November 2022. We honor him for his life.

Rocky Mountain March for Life Civil Rights Begin in the Womb Monday, January 16, 2023 9 AM to 1 PM, MLK Day

In January 2023, the center of focus for the Rocky Mountain pro-life movement will shift from the State Capitol to Colorado Springs. Respect Life Denver's decision to forego their annual January Celebrate Life March opens the door for pro-life witnesses to gather in Colorado Springs for the traditional MLK Rocky Mountain March for Life. The theme is *'Civil Rights Begin in the Womb'*.

The day begins with a Rally on the Sidewalk near Planned Parenthood at 9 AM. (For parking if you intend to join the march, plan to arrive at Corpus Christi Catholic Church at 2318 N Cascade Avenue between 8 and 8:30 and ride the shuttle up to the sidewalk.)

In addition to prayers, the rally will include remarks by Catherine Wheeler, M.D. who performed abortions during her years of medical practice but had a profound conversion of heart and now speaks out as an advocate for the sanctity of all human life.

The March for LIFE will commence at 10 AM and will conclude at Corpus Christi Church where we will share more prayer, Catholic Mass, a pizza lunch, and fellowship.

# January 22, 2023 Sanctity of Human Life Sunday

Fifty years ago, on January 22, 1973 the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision instantly shattered pro-life laws nation-wide, and gave parents the "right" to hire a doctor to kill their children prior to birth.

By June 2022, when Roe was finally overturned, more than 60 million children were dead and liberal politicians were poised to expand and radicalize state-level abortion laws by re-labeling newborn children as a woman's "products of labor."

Since 1984, the third Sunday of January has been designated National Sanctity of Human Life Day. As the fight to defend ALL Human Life continues, PPCFL intends to host an event recognizing the end of *Roe v Wade* and facilitating the conversation and strategy for moving forward. #### 7. Pray The Rosary



# MEET THE 2022 APOSTLES FAITH BUILD PARTNER FAMILY

Prisca and Noella are sisters who originally hailed from the Central African Republic. They fled with Noella's son after violence swept through their homeland. Noella, Prisca, and Noella's son came to the United States as refugees and currently live in a very small apartment. They are excited to rebuild their lives in a stable and safe community. Noella and Prisca are looking forward to "be[ing] able to have the freedom to be responsible for our home so that when it is paid for it will belong to our family."

Noella shared words of gratitude for the donors and volunteers who have helped build their family's home: "God never ever leaves us behind, and here we are. We lost everything, but God... he's provided us more. Like we are going to get a home and I am so, so thankful about that. ... Thank you for everything that you guys provide us. I just want to say thank you. Thank you so much."

Other information spoken about during that 12/10/2022 house dedication:

They are a low-income working family that now has an interest-free 30-year mortgage.

Both Prisca and Noella have been multi-lingual before they came to the USA.

Both Prisca and Noella learned English after coming to the USA.

Prisca recently obtained her U.S. citizenship after passing the citizenship test on her first try.

Noella plans to become a U.S. citizen next year after completing her 5-year U.S. residency requirement and passing the test.

To control her nervousness in front of the large dedication audience, Prisca spoke in French. An interpreter translated her expressions of gratitude into English.

Prisca worked full time while also completing her 200 hours of required Habitat work.

Some of the money earned here by these sisters is sent by them to their remaining family in Africa.

## THE WISE MEN

Does it seem like the wise men brought the wrong gifts to the baby shower? Shouldn't the kid have gotten an action figure King David doll with a slingshot or something practical to suck on? What are the gifts of "Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh" all about? Let me try to connect the dots.

The Magi's gifts were the Christmas miracle. Gold was fitting for a King ... right? This gift funded this poor family's extended excursion to Egypt. How else would a blue-collar carpenter, who just paid a significant tax bill, keep afloat in a not so friendly land? Gold was their golden ticket to avoid the genocide in Bethlehem. Frankincense was used by the priests in the temple giving off a sweet aroma when crushed. Jesus is our High Priest. Myrrh was an embalming agent. Huh? Every person would say, "Hey, that's for dead people." Yup! I know this was not on Mary's gift registry, but this baby was born to die.

Matthew 2:11 states: "On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Someone said that these "magi were men who 1) read and believed God's Word, 2) sought Jesus, 3) recognized the worth of Christ, 4) humbled themselves to worship Jesus, and 5) obeyed God rather than man.
